A significant amount of work has been achieved working with local communities to deliver a number of projects in the Activity Plan. An evaluation of the work is underway at the moment. There is not enough space here to set out all the projects, just a few highlights over the years:






The story teller project. Macastory were commissioned to work with the schools and local community groups to discover and record local stories about the history and heritage of Penicuik. The pandemic interrupted access to the schools so a video was produced and subsequently a drama production with one of the schools which proved very successful.

- Fiona Maher an artist in residence was commissioned who worked with local communities. She had a residency in the Pen-y-Coe Press and the Town Hall producing artwork related to the papermaking industry and permanent artwork is now on display in the Town Hall.
- Heritage Heroes project with Archaeology Scotland and the schools was very popular together with a long running series of heritage workshops based in the Town Hall and the schools.

This is just a snapshot

The Hearse House Restoration and the development of the Heritage Trail:

The grant secured from the Scottish Government's Place Based Investment Fund will mean that the Hearse House in St Mungo's churchyard will be restored and used as a focal point for the Penicuik Heritage Trail. The structure will be repaired i.e. stone repairs and roof repairs with new timber boarded doors. Inside will be an exhibition about the town and it will be open to visitors on a seasonal basis as part of the Penicuik Heritage Trail. It is also proposed that a number of interpretative panels will be located in key positions in the town centre to provide information about important historic buildings and places.

The Project **Archivist**

All of the images have been digitised and many documents. Volunteers were trained and young people were introduced to the collection i.e. the Princes Trust and local schools.




There were many other activities where the archivist assisted in providing historical evidence, information and advice i.e.:

This newsletter gives a brief update on the project so far which includes progress with the building and shopfront grants, the completion of the public realm work outside the Town Hall, the approval of additional grant sums for shop front improvements and the completion of the archivist and support officer's work. There is also an article about the Hearse House restoration and the Heritage Trail.



Proposals for No 4 The Square

A bid for additional shop front improvement grants has been successful meaning that an extra 5 shop fronts can be grant aided. These include 26 High Street, No3 The Square and 10-12 John Street.

The public realm improvements outside the Town Hall and up to St Mungo's church are now substantially complete giving a safer and more accessible access to the Town Hall and St Joseph's. This has been funded through a grant from the Scottish Government's Place Based Investment Fund.

Grant application for No 4 The Square

A grant application is expected to be submitted for the restoration of the old grain warehouse building, creating a commercial unit on the ground floor with two flats above. The existing building will be restored with a new mansard roof to match the original. The sheeted roof extension to the side will be demolished creating a courtyard area with vehicular access. This is a high priority building within the scheme.























The Project Area

The Penicuik Heritage Regeneration Project is now in its 5th year. It has been agreed to extend the project for a further year due to the time lost during the pandemic. The building grant rate has been increased and this has encouraged the uptake. The grant fund is committed now apart from the additional 5 shop fronts which will be funded through the additional grant recently approved.


